## **Sheila Hollins - President of the Catholic Union**



Congratulations to Sheila on her latest appointment. This is a very distinguished role in public life which she will be holding and so let us all keep Sheila in our prayers. It is also the first time in its 150 year history that the Catholic Union has appointed a woman to this role.

Baroness Sheila Hollins is the new President of the Catholic Union. The crossbench peer and professional psychiatrist was approved by members of the Catholic Union at their AGM on Tuesday 28 November, at the London Jesuit Centre. She takes up the role with immediate effect.

Baroness Hollins is the first woman to hold the office of President in the Catholic Union's 150-year history. She takes over from Conservative MP, Sir Edward Leigh, who had served as President since 2014.

#### **OUR CHRISTMAS CRIB**

Our Christmas Crib is kept in a box in the loft, wrapped in bubble wrap, to protect it from knocks and dust. It comes out each year, making me feel warm and cosy inside. Is that the same for you? Do you unwrap each piece and smile as you do? Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, the kings, the donkey, the manger and smallest of all, the baby Jesus. Comfortable nostalgia, I guess. Is that the same for you? I arrange them all with care, starting at the back, until there's hardly room for the baby in the manger. I have to move the figures around, to make space. Is that the same for you? Do you have to make space in your life, for the Christ Child at Christmas? In the hectic rush of festive cheer do you really make room? I'm not sure that I do. And when Christmas is over and the busyness subsides, I pack it all away, with care, in the bubble wrap, in the box, in the loft

and leave it there.



Is that the same for you? Do you keep the Christ Child stored away safely, out of sight and forgotten until the following year? Are you, like me, distracted by the peaks and troughs of life as you navigate through? Is that the same for you? Occasionally, when scouring the loft, I catch sight of the Crib and think of the baby, born to bring hope to a troubled world. I allow that hope to give me strength and welcome the peace it brings. I sincerely pray that's the same for you.

# CARING FOR CREATION

### **United Nations Climate Conference (COP 28)**

COP28 is the annual Conference of the Parties where world leaders meet to discuss, report and decide on global progress to reduce carbon emissions. This year it has taken place in the United Arab Emirates from 30th November to 12th December.

Some background: In 2015, at COP21, governments signed the Paris Agreement to commit to taking action to reduce carbon emissions and keep global temperature increases to below 1.5C. At the time, the UK was leading the way in setting annual carbon budgets and developing policies to enable the UK to meet those targets. However, the UK has recently rowed back on some of those commitments and has not delivered on its promise to pay into the Loss and Damage Fund.

We are running out of time for the action needed to limit warming to below 1.5C. At COP28, scientists will present the most recent climate science to decision makers. World leaders will also be discussing the Loss and Damage fund. Industrialised countries have a climate debt to pay to developed countries as we have benefitted from burning fossil fuels. Those who have contributed the least to climate change are feeling the impacts of climate change the most. The UK must pay into the Loss and Damage Fund. Christian Aid have presented some options for redirecting finance to enable to UK to deliver on this promise, including Make the Polluters Pay proposals.

Please also write to your MP, and ask him or her to publicly call on our government to do four things:

- 1. Deliver the UK's existing pledges on international climate finance, predominantly through grants and without further depleting the aid budget.
- 2. Pay into the new Loss and Damage Fund agreed at COP27.
- 3. Make the UK's big polluting companies, including fossil fuel companies, pay in order to fund the UK's Loss and Damage contributions.
- 4. End all new UK fossil fuel projects and invest in renewable, efficient energy instead.
